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NOTES

NCAA Division I men's hockey continues to enjoy an era of unprecedented talent, parity, and success. Consider:

- More than half of the nation's teams (35/64) have reached the NCAA Tournament over the last five years.
- Fifteen new college hockey venues have opened since 2010.
- More college hockey alumni than ever before are playing in the National Hockey League.
- ➤ 233 NHL draft picks will play college hockey this season, including 14 first-round selections.
- Nearly half (15/32) of the NHL's general managers and 13 of the league's head coaches played college hockey.
- > 93% of NCAA Division I men's hockey players earn a degree, among the top graduation rates of all men's sports.
